We purchased over 640 supermarket vouchers over October half term for those who usually receive free school meals when the government chose not to fund meal vouchers.

We tested over 500 students per day with in-school lateral flow tests in the first few weeks of the spring term when we returned after lockdown.

We are supporting 16-24 year olds at risk of unemployment with nearly 40 placements across our schools through the Government's Kickstart scheme. We are expecting up to another 60 staff to join in September 2021.

Over 90% of our staff say they are proud or very proud to be part of their school.

Wallbrook Primary Academy in Coseley, and Lightwoods Primary Academy in Oldbury joined the Trust this year.


We are also in the process of completing due diligence processes for a number of other schools to join us over the next few years:

### **Trust Highlights**

### Trust named as example of "transforming education"

Shireland Collegiate Academy Trust has been named as example of "transforming education" by Secretary of State for Education, Rt. Hon. Gavin Williamson CBE MP, in his 2021 EducationFest Keynote speech.

The Secretary of State said, "From Harris Academies in London to Outwood Grange in the North, from the Shireland Academies Trust in the West Midlands to the Inspiration Trust in East Anglia, we are transforming education".

#### Our impact

As a Trust we have a lot of experience in improving standards in our schools. The 2019 data for our four schools where this is available show that:



Shireland Collegiate Academy had the best overall data in Sandwell at Key Stage 4 over 3 years.



Thorns Collegiate Academy is currently the most improved secondary school for both Progress 8 and Attainment 8 in the Black Country area.



Holyhead Primary Academy moved to 5th from 58th in the Local Authority combined reading, writing and mathematics indicators at Key Stage 2.



Tameside Primary Academy has shown a 50% improvement in terms of its Key Stage 2 indicator.

### Developing the primary curriculum

We have had our Excite, Explore, Excel (E3L) primary curriculum in place for around four years. This year we agreed to sell E3L to Hodder, one of the top three publishers in the country. Hodder are now publishing our E3L curriculum as their primary offer to all the schools they support across the country. They have about 8,000 schools who use their curriculum.

### New outdoor facilities for schools

At most sites you will see building works over the summer and into the autumn term and keep an eye out for some new outdoor facilities popping up at your school soon!



### **Passport to Success and Family Enrichment**

We have long history of working with our families and the local community to support learning in the broadest sense. The Trust offers a range of activities which are not only fun and enjoyable for children but will also raise standards in and outside the classroom through the Passport to Success Scheme.

Designed by the Trust, the Passport to Success award scheme has been specifically set up for parents and carers of our students who attend schools within our Trust. As a Trust, we recognise the importance of our students having a wider experience beyond the classroom, to develop their character and cultural capital. This scheme is a helpful tool used to support you and your family and encourage involvement in your child's education.

### **Encouraging collaboration across the Trust**

Each term, the Enrichment Team organise a collaboration event that includes all the schools within the Trust.

In February 2021 we hosted our very first virtual family quiz. The multiple-choice quiz was open to all schools within the Trust, of which 50 families attended. We then had 21 families join us for our World Book Day quiz in March. By the time you read this we will also have hosted our third and final virtual quiz of the year themed around summer!

### **Supporting Families**

During lockdown it was important to support our families as much as possible. We kept in weekly contact with a selection of families from all our schools to discuss any issues they were having at home. Families were very grateful for the extra support, and we continued to speak to these families once schools reopened.

### Passport to Success and Enrichment in numbers:

18 yoga videos from the Hippodrome Education Network shared with primary pupils for them to follow during lockdown to support mental and physical health and wellbeing.

Over 60 different families offered personal support this year through phone calls and text messages with the Enrichment Team.

Over 70 families joining our virtual quizzes.

18 workshop sessions delivered across 4 schools.

7 schools participated in Hippodrome Education Network Showcases.

My role is to support the secondary school Principals to deliver a high-quality education for the students at their schools. This involves sharing good practice between the schools and ensuring that there is a good level of collaboration.

This has never been more important than during this year. During the pandemic we have supported each other through the delivery of virtual learning and sharing tips and strategies to make lessons as

interesting as possible for students. We also centralised the creation of food parcels and these were then distributed to all the schools. We supported the asymptomatic testing programme by ensuring each site had enough additional staff to make the process run smoothly.

I am most proud of the way that the schools have supported families' and students' mental health and wellbeing during the pandemic through a whole series of events from the wearing yellow for mental health days to Mr Brogan's Run Every Day February challenge for Shireland students and staff, for which he received a nomination for National Teacher Awards.





# Shireland Collegiate Academy Debate Mate Champions

Students from Shireland Collegiate Academy were crowned champions in the nationwide Debate Mate competition, as part of Comic Relief and GSK's partnership to fight malaria and inspire the next generation to take action and raise awareness of the deadly disease.

### Red January/February 2021

Red January is a community initiative that encourages people to support their mental health and form good habits by doing something active every day. Mr Brogan and the PE team battled cold, rain, wind, ice, snow, and more snow but still managed to cover a distance of 573km in 31 days! Students then joined the staff for Red February and were set the task to run, swim, cycle or take part in any of their favourite fitness activities, to beat away the lockdown blues.

We all know how important wellbeing is. Students in years 7-10 have had the opportunity to become 'Wellbeing Ambassadors'. The role is ideal for students who are interested in supporting their peers and making a positive contribution to the mental health of students at Thorns. The successful applicants were provided with half a day's training from their school counsellor.



### Success in Junior Maths Challenge

Aimed at pupils in Year 8 or below in England and Wales, the challenge is a 60-minute multiple-choice quiz that encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency when using basic mathematical techniques. We're very proud to see Thorns students receive eight bronze awards and three silver awards alongside three 'Best in School' and one 'Best in Year' award. Well done to everyone!

# West Bromwich Collegiate Academy Egg Watch

In late April the Academy received an incubator of Living Eggs in the Science lab. All students were able to see the incubator and observe the hatching and development of chicks and a few students were selected to monitor and care for them more closely. In just over 3 days the chicks had hatched and started to explore their home!

### **New building**

The new build is coming along well and on track to be open for the next academic year. The second phase will include many new facilities including a football pitch, sports hall, science labs, immersive room, design workshops, art and music rooms and a behaviour counselling centre.
